Before:

Ordered poster pack and stickers from The Pod.
Some Year 4 & 5 from Eco Club did school assembly on what goes in classroom bins.
Eco Club prepared Snacks & Ladders board games and Waste Sort Game (from The Pod).
Notice in Newsletter re clothes bag collection.
Year Six decorated 3 tee shirts for Waste Wardens.
Corridor display up on Friday before with what we were doing.
Letter to classes re what was on offer.

Week:

Waste Wardens in tee shirts and cap inspect classroom bins every lunchtime, rota of 4, 5, 6s. Awarded smiley and sad faced stickers according to the waste in the bins. Put up on chart on corridor display.

“Eco Club made a big warning poster to encourage members of the staff to put the correct waste in the correct bin because we had heard that it was atrocious what most teachers thought went in the recycling bin.” This poster went on twitter

Classes could:

- litter pick round school – bibs, bags and pickers available, and playtime rota
- Box of plastic to sort
- Snack & Ladders board game for each class
- Waste Sort Game for each class
- give out stickers on last day
- Families brought in bags of clothes for our collection bin.

Follow up:

Eco Club surveyed teachers about what they did during the week.
Year 6 class are now writing about how to reduce landfill waste.
Amey coming in to do an assembly to follow up what children remember.
